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Executive Summary

This executive summary provides an overview of the activities of N. R. College, from Shrawan 2077 to Ashar 2078. The complete report will be available in college administration by the end of the fiscal year and will provide a comprehensive review of academic achievements and challenges of this College.

Regarding the history of this college, as per college records, it was established in 2063 B.S. with sincere efforts of some eminent educationalists devoted for teacher education in Nepal. Initially it started three years Bachelor's degree in education and 50 students in the beginning and initial stage (N. R. College admission Records, 2063). As per College record, it has more than 500 students in different level of education. The college firmed to serve the expectations of the stakeholders by developing and supplying the academic excellence required for nation to serve in different schools, colleges, and education administration.

Our regular efforts have developed the college to foster social harmony, economic growth, to create the access of higher education in the northern part of Kathmandu i.e. Tarakeshwor Municipality.

The College has shifted some of its academic program from Nepal Rastriya Secondary School to its own building. In this regards, the college has achieved success in owning lands, partially completed the civil works, and has shifted some of its activities and Bachelor's and master's degree program in new building and locality.

R. College incorporates the philosophy of "Quality education in affordable price", focusing on student success and alignment of the college with research and teaching missions to advance the economic and social development of our community. The academic glory of college is directly based on experiential learning, faculty grants, smooth operation, students and teachers endeavour. Leading forward N. R. College to academic advancement, we believe this report effectively serve, the stakeholders of the college.



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Background

This annual report has been prepared to inform the stakeholders about the activities of N.R. College. It is based on the 5-year strategic plan of college to serve and meet the changing needs of the society specially the northern part of Kathmandu. N. R. College is primarily an institution of higher learning devoted to quality teacher for quality education. The objectives embedded in the founding of this college, clearly focused the college and centered its entire academic activities to impart quality education. The student enrolment in higher education is increasing but in education program is gradually decreasing. The charm, validity and the market perception towards the education program is questionable. The philosophy of imparting education is changing by discriminating students in the enrolment of higher education. The education program is the attraction mainly to the low graders in secondary school examinations, academically poor students, low family income students, women, Dalits, and other marginalized group of society. N. R. College has created several opportunities for students from remote areas and in the northern part of the Kathmandu.

N.R. college has created organizational structure to serve the students. For this, departments coordinate the implementation of the quality assurance policy in the College. There have been efforts to uphold quality and standards with the objectives of ensuring good result and relevance in terms of employment prospects of the graduates. The College maintains predefined job responsibilities of departments, units and individuals. There is a scope for expanding the provision to develop mechanisms and processes for internal quality monitoring and checks the areas of teaching-learning and research. There is a scope for making it more efficient and effective by expanding participation and team work within the framework in a scheme of decentralized structure, responsibilities and authorities. As a response to the demand and planned activates, it has completed some of them like shifting the current College programs in its new building at Tarakeshwor Municipality-11, Nepaltar.

Academic Progress

Academic progress is the comparison of performance scores from one year to the next. N.R. college has made efforts to enhance academic progress each year. This section presents the academic progress of N.R. college in terms of enrolment trend analysis, pass rate trend analysis, and graduate trend analysis of the last three years. First, program wise/level wise enrolment trend analysis disaggregated by female and educationally disadvantaged students will be presented. Then, pass rate trend analysis disaggregated by female and educationally disadvantaged students will be presented. Lastly, graduate trend analysis of the last three years disaggregated by female and educationally disadvantaged students will be analysed.





Enrolment Trend Analysis of the Last Three Years

The given table presents the enrolment trend analysis of 4 years B.B.S., B.Ed., and B.A. The table presents program wise / level wise disaggregated by female and educationally disadvantaged students in fiscal year 2075/76 to fiscal year 2077/077. All of these three programs are annual programs. All of these programs show the increasing trends of enrolment each year. The increasing trend seems a bit more in B.B.S. than B.Ed. and B.A. program. However, the student enrolment seems decreasing in succeeding years in comparison to the first year in all programs. Therefore, the causes of the decrease in enrolment trend in 2nd, 3rd, and 4th years have to be explored to sustain the first year admitted students until graduation.

All of these programs show the decreasing trends of student numbers appeared in the end of year assessment in comparison to enrolment each year. The number of students who pass annual examination



is very few in the first year in all academic programs. However, the result seems to be a bit better in succeeding years in comparison to the first year annual examination.

Photographic maps of various types of diagrams.




Educational Equipments and Machinary

The college has got a library which contains more than 4,000 books including journals and reference materials. This has not been enough to meet the growing demands of the students. Moreover, college has not able provide latest journals, books, and references materials due to the lack of financial resources. The college has made a comprehensive plan to improve the condition of library in the future.

Furniture

The following table shows the existing furniture at N.R. College. According to the table there are 284 pairs of standard desks and benches. Five students can sit comfortably in each of these benches. Separate tables have been provided for the executive head and the head of departments as well as the accountant. Five big racks and steel daraj have been constructed for the faculties, library and account section. Similarly, 27 whiteboards are being used in the classroom. However, separate racks have not been provided for the individual teachers. The furniture at college is not enough for the teachers and students as the number of students is increasing each year. Therefore, college is planning to add furniture soon in the future.

Audit observations

From its establishment, N.R. College strictly follows the recommendations made by the financial auditor. A financial monitoring committee under the leadership of the member of a CMC was formed. The committee is supposed to monitor the financial status of the college. This committee performs social audit of the institution. Before the endorsement in the CMC meeting, the financial and monitoring committee reviews the statements provided by auditor. Then, CMC approves the college financial statement and provides some guidelines to implement the audit report if found necessary.

As per the decisions of CMC, Mr Shyam Krishna Timilsina of S.K.Timilsina and Associates is appointed as the auditor for the FY 2073/74. Mr Timilsina has pointed some suggestions associated with this account/administration/store and others to be addressed for smooth operation, transparency. The issues raised by Mr Timilsina have shown in the table below. Besides, the college administration has tabled this report to CMC for necessary action and further improvement.


Contribution of College to Society

Problems, Issues and Challenges

Problems

For over one and half decade, N. R. College has been working to uplift its educational standard by providing quality higher education but there are many obstacles and hurdles that are emerging. Some problems, issues and challenges associated with this college are as follows.

Short Term Problems

COVID-19 pandemic affected college this year due to which physical classes couldn't be conducted for about eight months (Chaitra 2076- Kartik 2077). Now college has begun classes with permission from Tribhuwan University and the local authority i.e. Tarakeshwor Municipality. Necessary furniture like tables, benches, drinking water, sanitation, playground for physical class and sufficient playing material are the general short term problems the college is facing.

Long Term Problems

- 1.Low enrolment; high dropout rate; and lack of highly qualified research faculties
- 2. Lack of full time faculties and staffs; lack of equipments, resources; lack of minimum facilities.
- 3. Financial problem: Depending on the students' fees only; no permanent other sources of financial resources; lack of fund for quality enhancement; budget constraints for infrastructure development

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- 4. Barriers of human resource development: lack of own faculty, no reputational provision of upgrading the faculties; most of the faculties are university and other college teachers, no sufficient classrooms and land of college, most of the classes are held in School building, semi-skilled non-teaching staffs
- 5. Single academic program: number of students increasing but there is no sufficient class room for them; only morning (no choice of students in timing)

Issues

- 1. Low participation from community
- Inconsistency in college policies
- 3. Poor implementation of strategic plan
- 4. Teachers dissatisfaction towards remunerations and facilities
- 5. Single stream- academic programs
- 6. Less priorities by Government and affiliating university to the community colleges,
- 7. Token grants allocation by UGC
- 8. Rapid decreasing of enrolment in education program,
- 9. Low level of managerial effectiveness,
- 10. Quality erosion

Challenges

- 1. Maintaing quality is the main challenge of this college. N. R. College is facing the high dropout rate and high failure rate in the college. The regularity, punctuality, regular teaching practices, low involvement in microteaching, low quality of thesis research works are some of the barriers of quality education in N. R. College.
- 2.Student unrest is another challenge. Among the challenges of higher education, it is important to address students' unrest. Lack of physical and educational facilities is bringing much hindrance in the way of development. Teachers are less motivated to do certain research work. With student prospective, teachers are not competent, and they are teaching in higher education institutions. The most important problem of higher education in Nepal is the political involvement of students in management.
- 3.Administrative reform is the next challenge. N. R. College is facing the big challenges of skilled manpower in technological field like in IT field. As a reform in the administration, N. R. College gives priority to skill and train staff in the days to come.
- 4.Less research works on college activities is also a great academic challenge. Many of the teachers do not have enough research skills and they peed that on that.

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- 3.Decreasing trend of educational budget is the next challenge the college is facing.
- 4.Permanent settlement of college has been another major challenge. The town area is highly populated. The land is very expensive to buy. The college has not got enough space to conduct extra-curricular activities.
- 5.Quality enhancement to students with present situation due to rented building is the next challenge. Currently, the college is using the school building of Nepal Rastriya Secondary School for conducting classes. So, conducting all classes on its own building has been a challenge.

Opportunities

Increased awareness of educations in new areas/Municipality.

M. R. College is the second degree College in the Municipality.

Regarding outer ring road, N. R. College will be a center point and accessible to all people living in the northern Part of Kathmandu Valley, Nuwakot, Dhading, Rasuwa and Gorkhadictrict.

The growing concerns of the stakeholders are very encouraging and appreciable.

Learning has got high priority individually or organizational wise.

There is a big scope to conduct the research works.

Availability of skilled manpower/human resources are another positive dimension of College.

New premises and environment will be highly academic rather politics.

ways and techniques of learning and teaching are being subject of discussion.

Threats

Competitors are growing from national and international perspectives.

Students are demanding more facilities.

Government intervention is increasing and financing is decreasing.

Make of affiliating university (TU) is not community college friendly

enrolment in education is a big threats to the colleges conducting only the education

Measures Taken to Address the Issues and Challenges

Aforementioned problems, issues and challenges are associated with this college. The following measures will be taken to mitigate them.

- 1.An advisory committee has been formed to involve community participation in the college
- 2.RMC has been fully authorized to perform the research based activities in the college
- 3. College Regulation reviewed committee has submitted its report to overcome this problem
- 4. A separate team has been formed to review the strategic plan and analysis the poor implementation of strategic plan
- 5. A committee has been formed to review the resources and remuneration of the faculties and staffs
- 6. CMC has decided to conduct the programs of other stream rather than education. For this College is trying for affiliation of other academic programs from TU
- 7. We appeal for the increment of grants
- 8. Public commitment to enhance the quality
- 9. Hired skilled and committed manpower in managerial duties
- 10. Quality enhancement through quality teaching with use of ICT in classroom
- 11. Student counselling for less political interference
- 12. A team has been formed to settle the issues of college conduction from its own building
- 13. Concentration on infrastructure development

Plan for Addressing the Issues and Challenges

College has developed three years' strategic plan to overcome its problems and issues associated with this College. Besides, CMC has decided to solve the following problems. They are as follows;

Full time subject department head will be appointed as soon as possible.

They will be assigned to evaluate all class and have in intellectual analysis with full commitments.

Departmental system will be forwarded to execute the future plans and policies to this College.

Clear responsibility, transparency of work, result oriented teaching should be minutely defined to develop a positive change as it is a great challenge which is to be solved immediately.

There will be provision of award and punishment to bring the aimed result in all subjects through department heads.

New salary system will be developed on the basis of qualification, efficiency and time given by them and others.

A provision of basic subject teacher's will be changed and qualitative and energetic lecturer with full time should be appointed after the recommendation of committee.

Those students who achieve the best score in the in final exam of T.U. from our own College will be prioritized to fulfil the vacancy of lecturers of this College rather than outsiders.

N. R. College will emphasize the regular meetings and trying to increase the compliance of teacher's efforts with the policies that the College has taken to enhance quality.

With the support of the teachers, students, students' union, and expert's efforts will be directed towards reducing absenteeism, turnover of faculties, negligence's, etc.

College will get support from all departments heads by maintaining close relation and for regular consultations

College will get support from teachers through effective coordination of department heads

There will be increase in its achievement with the development of team sprit with faculty members, students, students' union, department heads, and others.

The college has planned to add some land with community support. As a preliminary work, it has started works with local communities to strengthen relation and identify the possibilities for mutual benefits with local community.
